Electronic Crimes Task Force, Speaker Michael D'Ambrosio: He will discuss the complex threat of transnational organized crime against our critical financial infrastructure and the methodology of mitigating that threat. Our tactics, techniques, and procedures today are dependent upon a shared understanding of the threat and how we can collaborate and work together to share information in order to identify, investigate and prosecute those individuals and groups with intent to take advantage of our financial sector for illicit gain. The ability of both local law and federal law enforcement to operate within task forces that include representatives from the private sector is something the Secret Service has advocated since the creation of our Electronic Crimes Task Force (comprised of state and local law enforcement as well as private sector partners) and is even more relevant against today's adversaries. Information and data sharing will be discussed.

Social Media in Investigations, Speaker Sam Palmer: Social media data and information has become extremely important and actionable to investigators and analysts. Effectively examining and analyzing the massive volume of data across numerous social media platforms is virtually impossible. Utilizing tried and true techniques, coupled with sophisticated software will enable and assist an analyst or investigator with filtering through the noise to extract actionable information from the social media world. When obtained and analyzed properly, social media data has the potential to provide law enforcement professionals with critical information. Social media data and information has something for everybody, from both pro-active and re-active perspectives.

If you are spending countless hours 'trolling' social media platforms the old fashion way and you want to step-up your game, this session is for you. 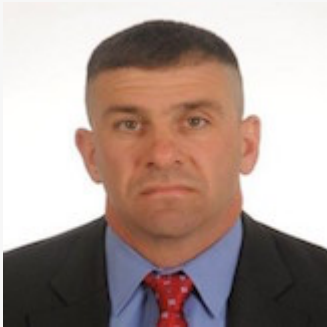
Keynote Speakers



Annie Mitchell – Supervising Crime Analyst, LA Sheriff's Department

Annie Mitchell is a Supervising Crime Analyst with the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department (LASD) which employs 69+ Crime and Intelligence Analysts. She has been in Crime Analysis for 29 years with assignments in patrol, intelligence, and federal task force operations and with the LASD for a total of 41 years. Annie is the training coordinator for the LASD Criminal Intelligence Bureau, Sheriff's Analysis Unit and has developed an

extensive six month training program for newly hired analysts. Annie has developed and taught training courses for both crime analysts and sworn personnel regarding crime and intelligence analysis. She understands the necessity of information sharing among law enforcement agencies and helps analysts put this into practice. She is presently serving her second term in the Southern California Crime and Intelligence Analysts Association (SCCIAA) and is a member of the International Association of Crime Analysts (IACA). Annie promotes the value of staying connected with other analysts and law enforcement entities in order to enhance the sharing of best practices, investigative techniques, criminal patterns and behavior, to name a few. She has been involved with recent critical events that have been occurring throughout the Southern California region and her network of analysts has played a significant role.



Michael D'Ambrosio - Deputy Assistant Director, United States Secret Service

Michael D'Ambrosio is a Deputy Assistant Director in the Office of Investigations. In his current position, Mr. D'Ambrosio oversees the planning and coordination of domestic and international criminal investigations involving counterfeiting, financial, electronic and cybercrimes. These investigations include the counterfeiting of US and foreign currency, bank fraud, money laundering, mortgage fraud, access device fraud, electronics communications fraud, computer fraud, network intrusions and identity crimes. Mr. D'Ambrosio currently provides strategic oversight to the 141 Secret Service domestic and 21 foreign field offices. Additionally, Mr. D'Ambrosio is responsible for the administration and resourcing of 40 Electronic Crime Task Forces (ECTF) and 46 Financial Crimes Task Forces (FCTF).



Sam Palmer – Detective, Phoenix Police Department

In 1995, Sam Palmer joined the Phoenix Police Department in Phoenix, AZ. Detective Palmer is currently assigned to the Phoenix Intelligence Center in the Homeland Defense Bureau where he is working in the Real Time Crime Center with a focus on real time and investigative social media. Palmer has served as a uniformed patrol officer, a field training officer, precinct specific crime analysis officer, and most recently as a tactical crime analysis detective for the Department's Crime Analysis and Research Unit.
